

We have been saving hard this year in order to further enhance our computers.

When we first installed the new suite, we purchased some desktop PCs and used the school Laptops to make up the class set of devices for computing lessons in the suite.

We have managed to purchase seven more PCs this term to complete the suite and release the laptops to be used in classes. In the library we have been working with the Schools' Library Service to audit and remove obsolete and/or damaged books so we can ascertain what we need to replace to refresh the library. We ran book stalls to rehome some of the removed books, used some to create book-based artwork and the rest were donated to The Oxfam Book Store.
