A Wild Day

Whole School Wildlife Day

Last week the whole school spent a learning day in the outdoors thanks to Neil Griffin and a team of volunteers from Wildlife Friendly Otley.

Mr. Young, our science leader, has been working closely with Neil, planning opportunities for the children to really enjoy our outdoor areas around school; alongside identifying further enhancements and continual improvements to some of our already established wildlife

areas.

Outdoor learning is one of the school curriculum drivers and much work has been done, led by Mr. Fisk, to grow the useable wildlife areas which support learning in school. Developing partnerships with organizations who can support our commitment to outdoor learning is hugely beneficial for school. Bulb Planting with Helen and Edwina

Neil had brought with him a small team of volunteers to help the children across the day. Helen and Edwina took the children around the grounds to identify places where some bulb planting may enhance the areas, both visually and to support visiting insects.

They then showed the children how to plant the bulbs carefully, making sure they were well orientated in the soil with the right amount of space between them and reminded the children to give the new plants a good water and firm the soil around them to help them

settle in. It will be great to see the fruits of their labours in the spring.



Going on a Bug Hunt

All the classes worked, in rotation, on a range of activities during the day.

One of the activities was to go on a bug and plant hunt.

Armed with identification posters the children explored all the different habitats the school grounds offer the local plants and animals. From

open field to meadows and woodland. They found many different species and thought about the different eco systems

where plants and animals live together. The children were

Wildlife Areas- Project Maintenance and Improvement

What a fantastic time we had on Sunday last week, in our outdoor areas. Several families joined us in the school grounds with tools, enthusiasm and lots of energy, ready to spruce up the existing outdoor areas and add some great enhancements along the way.

Mr Young, in partnership with Wildlife Friendly Otley members, had planned a whole range of tasks for children and families to tackle in order to transform some of our outdoor learning spaces.

One key area was the pond, which over the last few years had become overgrown and out of control. I joined River and other volunteers from Wildlife Friendly Otley, who expertly led some parents, a past pupil and a headteacher in a pond clearing exercise. Pruning trees which were overshadowing the pond and starving it of light and removing all the vegetation that was chocking the pond, transformed the space and will give the pond the opportunity to refill over

the winter. Meanwhile an army of volunteers led by Neil, Mr Young and Mr Fisk cleared pathways, pruned willow arches, created bug hotels and weeded the climbing frame area, high above the back playground. Thank you

Bikeability

In the first couple of weeks of this new school year, Red Kite class have engaged in the annual Bikeability course run by Cycle North. As part of the comprehensive training course the year 6 children have learnt how to check and maintain their bicycles so that they are roadworthy and safe to ride on the public highways. They have also learnt about the necessity of personal safety equipment such as helmets when riding on the roads.

The training course begins with maneuver practicing in the safety of the school playgrounds. This builds children's confidence

and control when riding their bikes as well as honing their expertise when navigating other riders. When the instructors felt that children were confident and skilled enough to ride on the roads they spent the next day riding around the local area under their close direction. Children earned their certificate and badge on successful completion of the course.

The children had a wonderful time and were incredibly sensible when riding around the area. Riding to school is great for children's health and for the environment. We hope that

children and parents now feel more confident to ride to school especially as the children move towards secondary school.
